FARMING NOTES

Well, it's time to pen another article for The Link – it's September 5, and hot and sunny, a bit of a change to a month ago. I'm pleased to say that harvest was completed on the of August 22; I might say it wasn't the best harvest I've ever cut but on the other hand, it's far from the worst.

All the wheat turned out well, I guess on par with last year. There was little difference between minimum tillage, direct drill or conventional cultivation fields in the end. Coming to the beans, none were as good as they looked and talking to other farmers in the area, they all seem to have had the same results. It's noteworthy the minimum tillage bean crop was frankly awful, though we aren't sure why. Nonetheless, most which were pulled into ploughed ground with our own cultivator drill were best by miles. Dan did mention that if we were in a position of paying rent, the worst crops would have lost us money. We grow the beans as a break crop to be followed by wheat, since they do put some nitrogen back into the soil through their root structures. My old and now passed neighbour Rob Harvey from Whichford called beans a 'wish' crop. When cutting them, you either wished you had planted more or wished you had planted none at all.

As I write, Dan is ploughing up all the oilseed rape stubbles. We do this because the rape is drilled straight into old stubble - by ploughing the rape stubble, all the trash is buried and all the soil is moved, ready to be worked down to drill with wheat. Dan has planted over 70 acres of oilseed rape, this year, he used our 'new to us' direct drill, on the heavier fields he subsoiled the stubble first to relive compacted soil from underneath without destroying the surface layer. I then rolled it, and Dan then drilled it into good seed beds. All emerged OK, but now the dreaded flea beetles are giving it grief and we now have nothing in our armoury to control them, so it is all down to a nice rain and the good Lord above.

Talking of that, we cut three sheaves of wheat for harvest festival – on cutting the last, Dan managed to cut his finger rather badly, which required a trip to Moreton MIU, a nice nurse applied glue and a dressing. Luckily, we got there just before the 7pm closure.

Last week I topped off the clover for the last time this year, we do this as if left it would fall down rot and kill out the crowns which should now hopefully overwinter and grow out again in the spring. It then can flower all summer until 15 August when it will be ploughed and sown with wheat and another area planted of clover planted to replace – working round the farm helping the bugs bees and

insects etc. The way farming is going at the moment, planting 'environmental' crops is gaining more and more appeal. We have several areas of wild bird mix plots or strips dotted around the farm, and as the summer draws to a close these look a picture now. They struggled in the wet then dry but the changeable



weather through July and August have them a boost – the sunflowers stand out and several other seed-producing plants will give quite a long succession of feed for wild birds, well into the new year.

Last week, I went with Diana to FarmEd – this is a recently planted farm called Honeydale Farm near Ascott under Wychwood. The owner, Ian Wilkinson is part of Cotswold Seeds at Moreton in Marsh, from whom we get most of our 'environmental' crop seed. Ian is

passionate about changing the way we farm, setting up many plots and larger areas with his clover and herbal leys that are good for the soil and the environment. We had one of the best cups of coffee I've tasted for years and very well priced to boot! I can't knock a thing he is doing, but feeding the world as it stands, I fear won't be possible with all of his methods. We have farming friends in Australia who have come over to visit twice in the last few years. They still use all the insecticides that have been banned here and in the EU for many years, often applying them by air, of all things. One of our previous prime ministers did a trade deal with them this year, but I fear we are far from being on a level playing field with them on many aspects of agricultural practice. Though at times I feel I'd be better not doing paperwork, recording everything we do for annual inspection, at least I think the public are eating something safer and more wholesome.

Still, moving on, if the weather and our plans work out, we should have all our autumn crops planted by mid-October. Most people used to say harvest home was the end of the farming year, I have always reckoned when I've finished drilling and tripped the drill out for the last time in the last point of the last field, I am done for the year and can relax. I find nothing better than looking round fields of winter corn or beans in full drill.

As always, I hope you find this of some interest, and you get to know at little of how a real farm works.

A Busy Summer Holiday

During the summer holiday extensive improvements were made to the school

sites. At Acorns Primary a new hall floor was laid, along with new carpet in Class 2. Brailes School was awarded a substantial Condition Improvement Fund grant from bids submitted to the Education and Skills Funding Agency back in December 2022. A new perimeter fence, including additional car park fencing and automated entrance gates were fully



funded by the grant to enhance safeguarding, which is just as well as no school budgets could afford such a project without substantial government support.

I was delighted to be invited to the official opening of the Shipston Museum at Old Clark House in August. The group, who have organised and fundraised for the museum, have done a brilliant job and the areas on display link well to our Cornerstones history topics. It's a real asset to the town and the schools in the Trust will certainly be using the museum to allow children to see artefacts and hear from experts. GARDENING NOTES

A hoped-for Indian summer did not appear apart from a hot week in early September. The rain which followed has meant that lawns have stayed green and foliage also remains green in the most part.

In October we hope for crisp if sometimes misty mornings, some sunshine during the day but cooler evenings. There may be early frosts so have fleece handy for more tender plants. Cut back perennial plants in borders as they die back but keep those plants in flower such as rudbeckia and dahlias as long as possible to sustain the bees. Also keep attractive seed heads which will also feed birds over the winter.

Dahlia tubers can be lifted and stored in a frost-free place once the foliage has been hit by the first frost.

Perennials can also be divided now and it is a good time to plant new shrubs and trees, especially evergreens, while the soil is still warm and damp. Areas that have been cut back should be weeded and mulched with compost.

Cuttings can be taken at this time of year. Root cuttings of plants such as papaver and anemone hybrids should be two to four inches, pencil thickness and potted just below the surface of the soil. Hard wood stem cuttings of fruit, e.g., gooseberries and currants, should also be of pencil thickness and length and put in the soil with the lowest bud about two inches above ground level.

In vegetable beds remove crops when they have finished producing and take out canes and other supports. Clean them before storage to prevent the spread of pests and disease. Leave the roots of peas and beans as they contain nitrogen fixing bacteria. You could remove the netting from fruit cages to allow birds in to eat any pests. Once tomatoes and other greenhouse crops have finished fruiting, remove their stems and clean and disinfect the greenhouse before moving in tender plants for the winter.

Rake up leaves from the lawn and make leaf mould by storing them in wire mesh containers or black polythene bags pierced with holes for aeration. Also, clear leaves from beds to help prevent the accumulation of slugs and snails.

Small plants may also get swamped by leaves which could cause them to rot. However, leaves can be left under hedges, shrubs and woodland to rot naturally and provide shelter for insects, spiders and amphibians over the winter.

Sweet peas can be sown in the greenhouse now if you want early flowers. Summer bedding in pots can be replaced with winter flowering pansies or violas and spring flowering bulbs. Lawns can be scarified to remove dead grass and moss, aerated with a fork and spread with autumn feed to strengthen the grass over the winter.

In the vegetable garden garlic can be planted, rhubarb can be divided and herbs can be potted up and brought indoors for use in cooking over the winter.



Hedgehog Houses

October is the month when hedgehogs start to look for a nice place to hibernate in our gardens. If you do not already have a hedgehog house, I have some locally handmade wooden ones for sale. They are all similar to the ones I sold at the coffee morning in the

Spring, with an entrance tunnel and adjoining sleeping area. However due to the increase in the price of wood these houses will be £35 each, which is still considerably cheaper than any of the good wooden ones found online. To anyone who already has a hedgehog house or is considering buying one, the best thing is to site it under a hedge or bush, put a small amount of bedding, either hay or soft straw and some dried leaves in the sleeping compartment and leave a medium plant pot on its side by the entrance to the house, filled with hay and/or dried leaves so that the hedgehog has a supply of suitable bedding close by. It is always very exciting when you find the plant pot gradually emptying

and maybe a trail of bedding leading into the hog house! Remember also to continue leaving food and water out for hedgehogs all winter as they never fully hibernate and often wake for a snack during the cold weather. This is when many hogs starve and die as they cannot find their natural food source. On a very cold night last January I found a small hedgehog out eating the food I had put out for a stray cat! He was alert, so after bringing him into the house, weighing and checking him over (and giving him more cat food!) I released him and he happily returned to his bed for more sleep!

The Cherington Arms

There has been speculation for a while now about the viability and future of the Cherington Arms, so I just wanted to let you know that I am in the process of buying it in order to preserve it as a village pub and prevent it being converted for residential use. That is my sole objective.

As I'm sure you know, the pub has been losing money and is in a very sorry state behind the scenes. This means that a significant investment is required simply to make it safe and comfortable for tenants to live in. I'm going to call that 'Phase 1' because I believe that it would be impossible to attract new tenants in its current condition. Therefore, unfortunately, it will have to stay closed until the work can be completed and new tenants found, although I'm hopeful that this will take less than six months.

After that, the pub would require a further and much larger sum to improve it and make it attractive and that may be a case of throwing good money after bad.

You don't need me to tell you that these are tough times for pubs. Over 150 were shut down in England and Wales in the first three months of 2023 and, in 2022, 386 pubs were lost for good (figures from the British Beer and Pub Association). So, while my aim is to complete Phase 1 and secure good tenants I really can't speculate at this point as to whether there will be a 'Phase 2', but at least we will still have a village pub.

I aim to provide regular updates over the coming months to keep you up to date about how it's going.
