



FARMING NOTES

Time for another Farming Notes. It's the 2nd of May, a lovely sunny day and a bit cooler. Yesterday broke all records for temperature in the UK for the first day of May. I went round the farm today and I was, on the whole, pleased with what I found. On the 23rd of April, Dan measured 18mm of rain. Prior to that, from the 23rd of February till then, our grand total was 8mm. That 18mm was a godsend, it took whatever fertiliser Dan had put on the crops down into the soil, so growing plants could start to make use of it. This year, unlike the last two, was much drier and spring sowing was done into much better seed beds, and earlier. All came up really well and seemed to be doing well till early April when cold frosts and cold winds held it back, and then no rain to speak of put it under some stress. All this had started to show till the nice rain of the 23rd. It was like a blood transfusion, everything looked better overnight. Mind you, looking at the longrange forecast for the next 14 days, there appears to be little more, if any to come.

As I've written before, if a crop is well rooted it can stand whatever the climate throws at it a lot better. In the last couple of days, Dan started topping off the clover crops we planted in our Mid-Tier, and later, Sustainable Farming Incentive (SFI) schemes. I took a photo on my phone, and it shows a wonderful cover of black grass amongst the clover. Blackgrass is now our worst enemy to crop production. One plant can, I'm told, produce 30,000 -40,000 viable seeds. Not all will turn into a plant but now a lot of the chemicals we use to control it are gone or the blackgrass has become resistant. I see it as a real blow, the present government stopping SFI overnight. The scheme we have taken advantage of ever since it came out, was a way to rest ground and add natural nitrogen to the soil. It needed no artificial fertiliser and must have provided pollen nectar, cover for all ground-nesting birds, and is looked pleasing to the eye. It must have had a carbon footprint of close to zero.

Normally when a scheme comes to an end, they have always in the past come up with a better idea. Of all the schemes, we have taken part in, going back over 20 years, I think the so-called '2-year legume fallow' had the most going for it. It may be of interest in the future if it all goes to plan. The little field first, the first one up the farm track, has been drilled with mustard. Our plan, or Dan's plan was to plant it, let it go to seed and I'll combine it. Our idea being, that all the wild bird plots we plant contain mustard, plus a lot more different seeds, and if we can grow our own, we can cut costs a bit and also use it as a green cover crop in the future.

Back in a time long gone by, in days of straw burning, we used to burn a winter barley stubble around the middle of July. I would fill our little Vicon Vari spreader with a mixture of nitrogen fertiliser at 1 cwt per acre and 8 pounds of mustard seed and broadcast it on the burnt stubble. I would put a set of disc harrows over it and usually in 4-5 days it would all come up. We would leave it to just start to flower, and I'd plough it all in and grow a very successful crop of wheat on the field. I can't find them at the moment, but I have some photos of our old - well new, then, county 4 wheel-drive, and 4 furrow plough burying mustard 4-foot high, and the soil a mass of roots. Now, the idea is to direct drill into the cover crop after it's been sprayed off.



I'm pleased to say all the plots of overwintered cereals; the photo shown in the last link of it being drilled, are all showing a full drill. Barring a natural disaster, it should provide the birds with plenty to fill their hungry crops next winter. Dan has drilled most of the wild bird strips with a mix of barley, wheat, mustard, sorghum, buckwheat and fodder radish. The idea being different birds like different things to eat. If all the things do what they are supposed to do, none will go hungry next winter.

GARDENING NOTES

May has certainly been a month with abundant blossom, with hawthorn in the hedgerows and cherry and apple blossom in orchards and gardens. The very warm spring weather has brought many plants into flower early. The once -and -only flowering roses are blooming and as I write in mid-May the shrub roses are also coming into flower. Peonies have also come out. In June more will follow, including philadelphus and honeysuckle and I think that gardens look particularly beautiful during this month.

Prune the early flowering shrubs such as philadelphus, deutzia and weigela after the the blooms have faded. They flower on the previous years wood so keep most of the older wood but to encourage new growth remove one third of the older stems to the base and then shape as required. Feed with fertiliser after pruning eg with blood, fish and bone and then mulch.

Soft wood cuttings can be taken from some of the new growth which has started to harden but is still pliable. Sand trays of damp horticultural sand can be used for cuttings of plants such as salvias, lavenders. penstemons and dianthus. Remove the lower leaves and any flowers or buds and cut just below a node. Plunge two thirds of the stem into the sand and place them in a warm place but out of the direct sun.



Keep feeding and tying in sweet peas and once they are flowering cut them regularly to maintain the flower production. After perennials such as lupins and delphiniums have finished flowering cut back the stems and some foliage and they will produce new leaves and may flower again. Also keep dead heading roses other flowering plants to encourage new

blooms. Trim back spent aubretia flowers to keep the plant compact.

Bearded irises can be divided in late June a few weeks after they have finished flowering. Dig them up and keep the younger rhizomes to replace the older growth. When replanting, trim the leaves to about three inches to prevent wind rock and leave the rhizome surfaces above soil level so that they are exposed to the sun. Divide about every three years.

In the vegetable garden keep sowing lettuce and other salad leaves. It is safe weather wise to plant out all crops after they have been hardened off (initially brought in at night).

Continue to earth up potatoes and water well. Some early varieties may be ready to harvest by the end of the month. Brassicas can be sown ready for autumn and



winter. Regular watering will no doubt be necessary paying particular attention to lettuce and spinach which tend to bolt if too dry. Peas and beans also need plenty of water for their pods to develop.

Tomatoes should be fed regularly with liquid tomato food

high in potassium so that the fruit develops and side shoots should be removed.

Feed container grown flowering plants to keep them flowering and dead head regularly. If it continues to be hot and sunny green houses will need to be ventilated and may need shading put up.

Although lawns will need to be cut, it is a good idea to raise the blade in a drought as this encourages the grass roots to grow deeper.

As ever, gardeners will no doubt be watching the weather and acting accordingly.

Long Compton and District Garden Club

Our final speaker meeting of the season was held in April when Colin Rogers, Head Gardener at Adwell House, near Thame, Oxfordshire gave us an overview



of "A Year in the Gardens at Adwell House." explained that the aim was something to have interest all through the year starting with bulbs early in the year with a succession of snowdrops, daffodils and tulips. There are trees, shrubs, herbaceous plants and he has a special interest in Salvia of which he grows many, providing colour and interest later in the season.

He explained about an interesting method of propagating plants by using a hydropod. This consists of a box, into which you insert

the cuttings in the top and sprays of water underneath ensure a quick method of rooting the cuttings. The results looked impressive.

Staff wise there are just one and a half, plus a few volunteers which is basically not enough for the size of the garden.

Lots of events are held there, car rallies and weddings, plus quite a lot of filming is carried out, all of which is interesting and brings in a good income but takes away from work in the garden and is generally somewhat disruptive. The garden also hosts a Rare Plant Fair in September.

The garden club now has various garden visits to look forward to during the summer months with the next speaker meeting being held on Wednesday 22 October when we hold the AGM followed by a talk by Avril Hughes on "Salvias and late summer colour", this will be part slides and a practical propagation demonstration.

Firstly, because I know everybody's been holding their breath, the good news is that Wilfred the cuckoo did make it back to the UK. He hit our shores on April 22nd and incredibly he's in exactly the same place where he was ringed and tagged last year. A reserve in Suffolk. Even more incredible is that he will only hang around long enough to find a mate and feed up. By the end of June his restless spirit will find him heading south again, a true 'rolling stone' of the avian world. The offspring that he will never meet will leave a few weeks later in July and August which begs the question, how do they know which way to go? Science suggests an inbuilt sat nav that relies on the earth's magnetic field, the night skies and genetic pre-programming to determine distance and direction. Just ponder that for a minute the next time you get lost in the car!

It can't have escaped anybody's notice that this spring has been phenomenal for blossom. The hedgerows have, at times, looked like they were blanketed with snow. Fruit trees have been smothered in flowers and wisterias positively dripping with blooms. Climate change is the main culprit with some plants now flowering up to a month early. Last year I wrote that May blossom might soon be renamed April blossom, and so it was this spring with hawthorns starting to flower in mid-April. Aside from being a visual treat this is good news for our insects. The early availability of pollen and nectar along with a lack of late frosts will set them up nicely for a bumper year, which of course benefits anything that feeds on them. It's all a far cry from last year's wet, cold and miserable spring. Of course, Yin and Yang comes into play and the price is a mini drought with no rain forecast for the next two weeks at least. Which means, come June, civil war might be breaking out at the allotments as we all vie for the limited water supply!

With all this blossom and the lack of frosts I'm wondering if 2025 will prove to be a 'mast' year. When trees such as beech, oak and chestnut produce absolutely vast amounts of seed. Science is still a bit hazy on why this happens, but spring weather clearly plays a part as more flowers than usual are pollinated. Let us see what happens!

I've recently taken on the renovation of a Victorian water garden complete with a 12ft waterfall and a fabulous grotto, all created many years ago using probably 50 tonnes of local stone. My first task was to strip out and rebuild the waterfall because much of the stone has now laminated and needs replacing, and while doing this I chanced upon a creature I haven't seen for over 40 years. To all



intents and purposes a miniature snake, exquisitely marked in subtle brown with a long black stripe down the length of its spine. A slowworm. In fact, there were two slow worms that I carefully relocated nearby away from the prying eyes of potential predators. Slow worms are in fact legless lizards and live out their gentle lives in cool dappled shady areas just like the water garden I'm working on. A bit of research suggests they aren't uncommon in Warwickshire, but our area hasn't had any records since 2000. They like the warmth of a good compost heap and gardens are vital for their conservation. If anybody has seen one locally, I would love to know!

WALKING NOTES

10,00 steps a day

We appear to be enjoying the most astonishing spell of good weather so that the usual references to mud and threatening skies have not been appropriate for some time and our thoughts must instead turn to the plight of farmers and possible impending restrictions on the use of waters for gardens.



A trip abroad meant Imogen and I missed April's walk around Broad Campden under sunny skies, passing the River Cam (still flowing well) and fields heavily populated with newborn lambs before lunching at the Baker's Arms. Fortunately, we will be present for May's outing to Snowshill.

Our absence was explained by a 2 weeks trip to several Northern Italian cities where, at the end of each tiring day, we collapsed onto the bed with two questions prominent – was city walking so much harder on the knees than Cotswold paths and second by how much had we exceeded our 10,000 steps?

A quick google search confirmed the former, with concrete being the least forgiving surface especially for those with even minor pre-existing knee problems, and cobbles posing additional dangers.

The 10,000 steps Google search proved illuminating. The idea has, I learned, its origins in the 1964 Tokyo Olympics when a step counter company launched the campaign using the Japanese character for 10,000 (pictured above) which resembles a person walking. Since then, countless scientific studies have researched the health benefits of following the programme.

Those benefits include reduced risks of cancer, heart and circulatory diseases as well as lowering the risk of dementia. 10,000 steps, or around 5 miles with an average stride, is perhaps too much for many of us to repeat every day but studies show that risks of heart and circulatory disease reduce markedly with lower figures. For those over 60 years old (and I should be careful not to guess the average readership age) the biggest improvements in health are amongst those regularly "managing" 6-10,000 steps each day.

So do join the local group for your health, good company and hopefully continued good weather.


Shakespeare Special



St George's Day and VE Day Celebrations

CAMEO members celebrated St George's Day (23 April) in style with a special teaparty.



Colin Beckett (pictured, seated) recounted the history of our patron saint born in Turkey in AD27. He became a high-ranking officer in the Roman army and was martyred in Israel in AD303 for refusing to renounce his Christian faith and bow to pagan idols. In 1415 he was officially adopted as England's patron saint by declaration of King Henry III.

Colin told those of us who think that Saint George was a somewhat mythical character, that his dragon slaying exploits were an imaginative addition only emerging some 500 years after he died, and that many other countries have also adopted this Christian martyr as their patron saint.



John Boulter (pictured) performed with gusto Shakespeare's memorable lines from Henry V of the king's inspiring address to his gathered knights on the eve of the Battle of Agincourt, which include: "We few, we happy band of brothers.... And gentlemen in England now a-bed shall think themselves accurs'd they were not here."


