FARMING NOTES

It's the 3rd of June and it rained today. While many days over the last 2 months when it forecast rain and we had little, or more likely nothing all here. It's now the driest spring since records began. Not so long ago it was two of the wettest seasons ever.

I'm being cautious in my words, but crops on the whole seem to have stood the drought better than I expected. I think due to how well they planted in good seed beds. Some of the later-planted areas for wild bird crops haven't fared as well. Some haven't germinated and some have and been eaten by many of the insects that attack seeding green growth. We now have no weapons left in our armoury to fight them off.

Dan has now topped all of the clover fields for the second time to stop any blackgrass seeding in them. They may need doing again if we do get some decent rain, and new growth keeps coming. Later they will be left to flower and seed themselves and grow onto next year when they will flower again before being destroyed to make ready for a flowing crop of winter wheat. This, I believe is the last time we will grow any, as the government, in their wisdom have pulled

the plug on all the schemes, so I guess the countryside will become a carpet of swaying corn of one sort or another.

Last week, we had a visit from the Shipston Flood Prevention Group, to look at the weeping dams installed along our stretch of Nethercote Brook. Some were damaged in the last wet winters. These will be repaired later this summer, He mentioned he had been approached by Severn Rivers Trust, telling him they had now got some funding for reedbeds and were we interested. Dan had given it some thought in the past and had a couple of areas in mind Well, within a couple of days, a young lady contacted Dan and fixed to come out to discuss things. She came today, got wet in the rain, then came in for coffee and a chat. She photographed a map or two and would go back to put ideas forward, ask for prices etc. and in the future, we may have two or three reed beds on feeder streams running into Nethercote brook that will hold back flow in times of spate, thus helping Shipston and the village, and be a benefit to nature as well. Still, it is not certain yet, but I hope it does come about.



Some years ago, now, a colony of very rare bats were found living in Whichford wood. They were the furthest north the species had ever been recorded. The Warwickshire Bat Trust became interested in this species and arranged many visits in this and surrounding farms as the bats were known to travel many miles in search of food. I've never heard the outcome of their research, but we were offered a small amount of seed to plant in order to attract the insects they feed on. A small container seed arrived and inside was a very heavy price tag. We selected a damp, unproductive area to plant it. I set up a drill and managed to sow four turns of a four-meter drill alone at the bottom of the

field in the shade of some trees. It all came up and it's been left untouched for over 10 years, and now, totally naturally, it now sports some Common Spotted Orchids and several unusual plants. So, you never know what's round the corner, and sometimes something good happens. Still, I'd love to some more gentle rain - not a wet month - and some sunshine in-between to fill the coming harvest.

GARDENING NOTES

The UK Butterfly Monitoring Scheme published their results for 2024 just recently (March 2025), and it made very troubling reading. 2024 was one of the worst years for butterflies in the 49 years that the scheme has been running - it ranked in 45th place, showing long-term declines for over half of our butterfly species. It was the second worst year for the more common garden species since 1976.

There are various reasons for this decline: it was a wet spring and a relatively cool summer, which hit the mating and breeding season. But there are bigger long-term issues like loss of habitat through development, pollution, and climate change. As gardeners, we can't do much about the weather or development; we could drive less-polluting cars, I guess, but we can adapt our gardens to help. It means planting more of certain types of plant and perhaps leaving the garden a bit messier.

Thinking about what caterpillars need, you can grow - or allow to grow - species-specific plants that caterpillars feed on. The holly blue caterpillar thrives on holly and ivy, the common blue will love any white clover you have in your lawn, and of course nettles for the small tortoiseshell (you only need a few nettles to make a difference!).

Adult butterflies appreciate nectar-rich flowers, particularly when planted in sheltered spots (wind can stop butterflies from feeding). Plants such as vipers bugloss, echinops, Shasta daisy, scabious, oregano, and of course buddleia. You can extend the availability of nectar with spring flowers like forget-me-nots and dandelions, and into autumn with verbena and perennial sweet peas. You can find which butterflies are most common in your area from the Butterfly Conservation website, which will also tell you what they like to feed on or hibernate in.

Try not to use pesticides, if possible. Any traces of pesticide in the soil can be absorbed by plants that caterpillars and adult butterflies feed on, to deleterious effect. And some butterflies, such as the Purple Hairstreak and the Speckled Wood, feed on aphid honeydew as their preferred food, so leave the aphids alone!

In order to feed and mate effectively, butterflies need to bask and warm up, so if you can make space for them to do that, it's very helpful. Dark rocks and big stones that retain the sun's heat are perfect for their basking.

The good news is that some species are adapting to the loss of their favourite caterpillar food plants: the comma, for example, which was a victim of the huge decline in hop-farming, has switched to laying its eggs on nettles, and the holly blue is moving northwards, colonising new areas in the Midlands. This is great news, but we still need to do more to help butterflies thrive.

NATURE NOTES

Mayflies. I'm not talking about the spring already hurtling towards summer, rather the winged insects that many of you will have noticed at the end of May and into early June. This year seems to have produced a bumper crop of these delicate 'Ephemeras' and I had several crashing around the garden. I was somewhat surprised because mayflies are normally associated with 'unpolluted' water (the larvae spend up to 2 years in the water feeding on algae and plants before emerging as adults) a title our local stretch of the Stour would struggle to live up to at times. Either way and unrelated the water quality is their longevity...or lack of it. Most last no more than two days while many last only a couple of hours. Another reminder of the fleeting nature of the world around us.



Another even more spectacular species that suddenly appeared in numbers in June was the day-flying scarlet tiger moths. Often mistaken for butterflies, these vivid moths have black forewings studded with white and gold splodges, while their hindwings are scarlet red with cryptic black markings. And for a couple of days in June my garden was full of the things. The adult moths start their lives the previous year when the caterpillars spend the late summer chomping on comfrey, green alkanet

and nettles. They spend the winter as a caterpillar emerging again in the spring to continue feeding and growing. Eventually they pupate and finally out pops the adult moth to delight us all in May and June. The purpose of this synchronised hatching is to find a mate and start the whole process all over again.



Staying with the lepidoptera theme it is with some relief that I'm seeing lots more butterflies this spring, so hopefully numbers will start to recover from last year's appalling wet, cold spring that decimated some butterfly populations. Keep an eye out wherever there are flowers and keep looking. Over the weeks, through the summer, various local species will hatch and create 'waves' of butterflies so at any site you might see different species

depending on what's recently emerged. A few days ago, it was marbled whites and I counted over 30 on an early morning walk.

One of the best sites for butterflies locally is the Sun Rising natural burial ground near Tysoe where they have created two butterfly habitats and have so far recorded 23 of the 38 species listed in Warwickshire. Obviously huge respect and reverence should be exercised when visiting this site; aside from the butterflies, keep an eye out for tree sparrows as well! Otherwise, the Warwickshire Wildlife trust has several reserves under 10 miles from us including Radway Meadows near Kineton, Hook Norton cutting and Loxley Church meadow. Look on their website for further details.

Finally, a quick ID tip for those that carry an iPhone. You can often identify a species by taking a picture on the phone then swiping the image up with your finger. If the image is clear and close enough the phone will often tell you what it is. I find it particularly useful for wildflowers (especially orchids which can look rather similar.) You can thank me when you see me!

The inn has a long literary history from Lewis Carroll through to Morse and the entrance features a stone lion said to be C S Lewis's inspiration for Aslan.



A few days later, a number of us were at Asthall Manor to wander through the gardens, stopping every few hundred yards to hear another one of the Mitford sisters reading letters or extracts from their various writings in an excellent production by Chipping Norton theatre entitled "*In the footsteps of the Mitfords*". Walks based on the family's houses at Asthall, Swinbrook and Batsford can easily be located

A Google search quickly revealed the possibility of further literary walks. Tolkien is buried close to the Trout in Wolvercote; the Rollright Stones, Broadway Tower and Moreton in Marsh all feature in his book "*Lord of the Rings*" as Barrow Downs, Amon Hen and Bree respectively, with The Bell in Moreton being the Prancing Pony.

Adelstrop Park is said to be the setting for Jane Austen's Mansfield Park. J.M. Barrie wrote much of Peter Pan at Stanway House where he organised a cricket team featuring, amongst others, Conan Doyle, AA Milne and P.G Wodehouse.

TS Elliott and Graham Greene both lived in and wrote from Chipping Campden, and it is possible to identify their houses and some of the settings featured on short walks.

A little further away, but still within an hour's drive, is my own favourite literary walk – the Laurie Lee trail at Slad, including 10 wooden posts embossed with Lee's poems and ending at his favourite pub - the Woolpack.

There are lots of other possibilities to be found both in books specifically featuring Cotswold authors and their walks, and in offerings from local travel companies. The local group will hope to try out others in the course of the next few outings.

SCHOOL NOTES

News from Acorns

As we rapidly approach the end of the academic school year, there is a vast array of activities being planned and taking place, from cluster athletics and rounders events to the Shipston Primary School Proms. We also have our own Sports Day and end of term celebrations during which we will say goodbye to our Year 6 leavers as they take the next steps in their educational and life journeys. A selection of Year 4 children will be attending a Maths Challenge Day at Kitebrook School, an event which has been thoroughly enjoyed in previous years. The Stour Federation Trust has also been visited by Trust leaders from Essex in recent weeks; each of the five schools has hosted the visitors and it has proved a great opportunity to share excellent practice and 'wonder' about ideas for future developments.



News from across the classes



In Little Acorns, to continue their Sunshine and Sunflowers topic, the children enjoyed planting sunflower seeds and caring for their seedlings. Reception children learned all about compost and created their own mini composter to see composting in action. Inspired by famous works of art and flowers in our garden, the children created some beautiful artwork. They used pastels to produce still life sketches of vases of flowers, poster paints mixed with flour to give the effect of acrylics to create sunflower

paintings, mixed media flower collages, water colour paintings and plasticine flowers.

Class 1 pupils have been developing their skills as time detectives in their *Movers & Shakers* topic. They've learnt how to read dates and order events chronologically, even the tricky 2000s! Using this new knowledge, they created timelines showing the birthdates of significant people from the past, as well as one charting key moments in the history of space travel. As part of their Design and Technology companion topic, *Chop, Slice and Mash*, children have started practising how to safely use a range of kitchen utensils, including peelers, sharp



knives, and graters, really enjoying preparing vegetables and working together to improve their chopping and slicing skills.

Science lessons in Class 2 have focused on dental hygiene and the importance of keeping our teeth clean. To investigate this, pupils carried out a

fascinating experiment using eggs to represent tooth enamel. One set of eggs was 'brushed' with toothpaste with the other left untreated, whilst left in vinegar! Over time, pupils observed the changes, helping them understand the impact of plaque and the protective benefits of brushing with fluoride toothpaste. There were some very surprising (and slightly smelly!) results, sparking lots of thoughtful discussion.

In Design and Technology in Class 3, children have been fully engaged in their Architecture project, learning how to build stable structures using recycled materials to create functioning buildings, connecting their learning to the main class topic: Groundbreaking Greeks. In Art, the focus has been on the Expressionist movement, capturing facial expressions through photos and using pastels and watercolours to create expressive portraits.

News from Brailes

This term has seen our Early Years children in Squirrels class travelling around the Big Wide World! The children had a wealth of ideas of how to travel in style, from front-loaders and tractors to helicopters and hot air balloons. They began by looking at our world on Google Earth and identifying the land and the oceans before travelling around the World on a magic carpet with "*My Granny Went to Market*" by Stella Blackstone, visiting lots of countries and looking at a suitcase of objects from all the places they stopped at.

Next, they talked about and explored our school village of Brailles and the surrounding countryside and compared it to Mama Panya's village in Africa. The



children played with animals from the African continent, dressed in traditional clothes, played the drum and thumb piano and made beautiful Ndebele patterns with pastels. Continuing with the animal theme, "*Under the Same Sky*" by Britta Teekentrup introduced them to animals from different habitats. Identifying the wild animals found around Brailles, they also discovered where lions and elephants live, and where you'd find a polar bear or a walrus. It's been a magical learning adventure filled with curiosity and wonder.

Children from Years 3, 4 and 5 enjoyed a wonderful visit to Sculpture at Kingham Lodge. Beneath a blue sky and glorious sunshine, the children explored 5 acres of beautiful grounds - a magical home to hundreds of sculptures.

They were welcomed on arrival by Christopher, the owner of the garden, who challenged them to explore the grounds and find sculptures made of stone, metal, glass, wood and resin. He explained that the sculptures had been made by local, national and international artists as well as children from local primary schools. Some of the sculptures stood tall and proud whilst others were hidden away in the long grass, hedgerows and leafy branches. They also spent some time sketching their favourites which helped them to look even more closely and notice tiny details.

We are very grateful to the work of CATS: Cotswold Art Through Schools, a charity delivering art, drama, dance and music experiences to schools in the Cotswolds, who funded our visit to the garden. The children found it very inspirational and it was a wonderful opportunity to widen our horizons and aspire to greatness!



Throughout this term, we have continued to build valuable momentum and our commitment as a school and wider community to encourage and support a Smartphone Free Childhood for our children, living our core values of courage, compassion and curiosity, growing together and shining brightly!

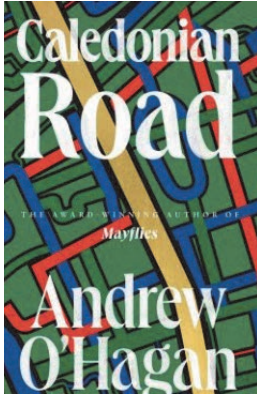

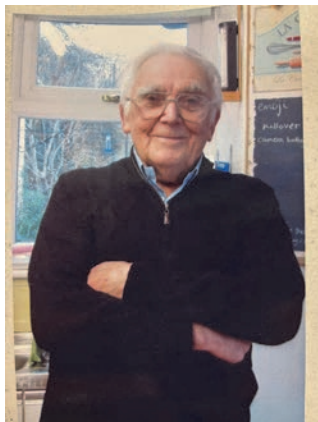
