#### **SW7 BENEFICE CHURCH NEWS**

I wonder if you've ever seen the footage shot in London on the day the second world war ended. There was a huge outpouring of celebration relief and thankfulness. I'm sure the same was true when the horrors of the first world war ended as well. Victory had been won; no longer would the threat of death hang over the country. I imagine the people of Ukraine will feel the same thing when their war with Russia comes to an end.



On Remembrance Day we remember with thankfulness those who have given their lives in war; without their sacrifice we could not enjoy the freedoms we have in this country.

The Bible frequently speaks of a victory and a sacrifice which has brought us freedom. Not a victory in war over another nation but a victory through suffering over the great enemy we all face; the enemy of death.

I wonder if you've ever read any of the poetry written by soldiers in the First World War? There's some amazingly powerful writing that comes out of that conflict, and one of the most consistent notes is the hopelessness that death brings.

It robs life of purpose and meaning. If death is all we can look forward to at the end of our lives, what possible meaning can our lives have? Death severs relationships, that's another theme that comes through the poems, written by the survivors. Friends are lost, families are torn apart never to be reunited; and that hopelessness and pain that death brings isn't just confined to those who die in war. I'm sure there's very few of us who haven't experienced the death of a loved one and the crushing grief it can bring. Worst of all death cuts us off from knowing God. Death is our greatest enemy because it robs us of that for which we were made – a loving relationship with God our creator.

However, in the face of death and all its consequences the Bible announces a great victory, won through the death and resurrection of Jesus. When Christ died and rose again, he defeated death forever, and promises life to all who will trust in him; Christ offers to share his life with us, so that when he returns, we too will be raised to life; life as it was meant to be lived, knowing and loving God as our heavenly Father into eternity.

Let me finish with some words of St Paul which capture the victory that Christ has won over death; a victory that he shares with all who come to him.

"Death has been swallowed up in victory. Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting? The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. (1 Corinthians 15:54-57)




What passing-bells for these who die as cattle?

I am very sad to inform readers of the passing of Tony Partridge, our long time Nature Notes writer, on Saturday 7 October.

Latterly, Tony was struggling with his health and his daughter-in-law, Anne Marie would transcribe his notes for The LINK as he spoke them to her, usually over the telephone. When you add in the slight complication that Anne Marie lives in The Netherlands, I think you begin to get a feel as to how important submitting his Notes was to Tony and his family.



For the eight years in which I edited the magazine, Tony never missed an issue, and he was invariably the first submission that I received for the forthcoming month. As health issues began to take a hold, his typing began to deteriorate and I began to get quite expert in interpreting his mistypes, some of which made me chuckle even more than his understated, self-deprecating humour which I found a highlight of my monthly LINK experience. Tony once told me that he had never missed an issue in 25 years. I'm not sure that The LINK and its

predecessors runs to that length of time but if it does, I'm sure he never missed an issue. For those who like to know such things, that's around 300 articles!

I also came across Tony as a fellow member of the Stour Singers. He sang tenor as I recall and once, I sat next to him in rehearsal. Not the easiest of pairings as I sing bass, but he got through it all with a smile on his face and a twinkle in his eye. It was the same twinkle that I found in his writing. He had a twinkle in his words which was unlike any other contributor to the magazine and one that I



am sure will be much missed by the family of LINK readers.

I always got the feeling of the young boy when reading his items. He was plainly smitten with the wonders of nature from a very young age and he kept that young perspective when writing. I know he will be missed greatly by his family, and I'd like to pass on condolences of behalf of the many LINK readers who were entertained and educated by his

#### **FARMING NOTES**

It is the 9th of October; I've just got in and Dan finished drilling the last of the winter wheat today. It's been a really difficult sowing time. We as usual in started in good time but spells of often unforecast rain made us change a few things. About half was ploughed and the other drilled into subsoiled stubble. This seemed a good idea at the time since it was very dry, then after several spells of heavy rain it looked hopeless for direct drilling. But, in the end, after several days of very hot sunny dry weather it dried enough to get it drilled. Some of the headlands in the shade of the brook, nonetheless, left a lot to be desired. Still, most of the crops drilled following the oilseed rape crop has now emerged and the slugs are our next problem.

We now only have one treatment which can deter the slugs from eating the germinating crops, and it is far from being satisfactorily effective. The only other solution is to drill early into a tight seedbed, when conditions permit, to stop the slugs moving around and hollowing out the germ in the seed grain. If the shoot makes it above ground, it will usually survive. The beans were far from good last

year, but as there is little else as a break crop for wheat, we have planted another 50 acres. Growing oats could be used, or peas, but the market for them is small and standards high. Planting peas on heavy clay soils in a bad spring would be quite difficult.

In my last farming notes, I talked of Rob Harvey; he like my father, lived and farmed through some dire times. They both saw big changes in farming - horses gave way to tractors, combines took over harvest from binders and bulk grain from hundreds of man-handled sacks. When Banbury market was running, they all went there to buy or sell. Later, when it had gone and they got older, Rob would call on a Thursday to see my father and often Ray Slatter would come as well. If I wasn't busy and saw their vehicles there, I dropped in – the stories and tales they came out with of goings on in the past should have been recorded, as now they are all gone and lost for ever.



Rob spent some of his childhood living in Long Compton at Waterditch Farm before later returning to Whichford. Rob used to make a lot of very good seed hay in those days, and I first met him in the far side of Yerdley Coppice one evening in June. He was stacking bales in eights by hand for a loader to pick up;

I walked round a 40-acre field helping him. He let me shoot pigeons on his farm for years after and no others, I cut corn for him and he for me in times of breakdown. He was a true friend, and his knowledge of local life was amazing. One thing I always remember was his saying; 'A pound saved is a pound earned'. He did say no one ever stayed very long at Yerdley Farm, my father-in-law was there for 12 years. I've been here for fifty-seven years, so I guess we have done something right.

I was rolling behind Dan's drilling today – a steady and quite boring job, I was thinking of all the old boys who worked this ground ever since it was enclosed in 1812. King George VI once wrote that the wildlife of today is not ours to dispose of as we will, it is in trust for those who come after us. Our land is much the same. It is farmed to produce food for us and fodder for animals to use. I think looking around today over our valley, I reckon they in the past and we today have done a pretty good job of it so far.

#### Let's Explore

It has been wonderful to welcome some new faces to our nursery and reception classes at Acorns and at Brailes this term, as well as seeing the safe return of those that were with us last year. The children have made a great start to the new school year, settling quickly, showing excellent independence when coming into school each day and getting used to the new routines.

At Acorns, children have made an enthusiastic start to our topic 'Let's Explore'. We began by thinking about ourselves, sketching and painting portraits and creating paper plate faces, before considering the wider school community. The reception children enjoyed exploring the main school building, meeting staff and children, and finding out about their roles in school. The children have especially enjoyed our key text, *We're Going on a Bear Hunt*, retelling the story with actions, sequencing pictures from the story, and creating some collage scenes of their favourite pages.

#### **School Days**

At Acorns, Class 1 have kicked off the year with enthusiasm and they have travelled back in time to the Victorian Era for the first topic, School Days. During this the children have explored how life has changed since 1837, researching clothes, food, sports and leisure, toys and the school day.

The children were lucky to have a visit from one of our local community members, Bill Cook, who talked to them about how school used to be and showed the class pictures of Acorns from years gone by. It was fascinating to hear that so many children used to fit in the Class 1 classroom and the parents used to stand in the lane at pick up time, just like they do today. Children giggled and were amazed that you could miss a day for such strange reasons. You could have a day off for helping your parents at home or going to the Mop Fair.

Following this, the class enjoyed a Victorian workshop from Hands On Oxfordshire Heritage. Alison spent the morning with Class 1, who were dressed up in aprons and waistcoats and had nails and hands checked! The children learnt about school rules, explored Victorian toys and the structure of the school day.

Children were shocked to hear that there were no iPads and toys that needed electricity or batteries were few and far between.



What did children do instead of watch TV, play on their dance mats or use the PlayStation? During the afternoon, Mrs Doney, ran some Victorian Drills with Class 1, which was instead of PE. It wasn't as fun as our PE lessons!

#### Warwickshire Sings and Learning the Ukelele

Owls class teacher Mr. Harcourt and the Year 3 and Year 4 children have begun an exciting project with 'Warwickshire Sings.' They will be visited by a singing teacher each fortnight who will develop the children's choral and individual singing skills. This sequence of lessons will, we hope, culminate in a concert with other Warwickshire schools where the Owls, and Brailes, can showcase our fantastic musicality.

Children in Badgers class have made an excellent start to the academic year and have been rising wonderfully to the challenges that a new school year brings. One such challenge has been learning a new instrument. Every Tuesday afternoon, for ten weeks, James Milsom from Create Music is teaching the children in Badgers class how to play the ukulele.

So far, the children have learned the names for the different parts of the ukulele and a useful acronym to help them remember the names and order of the different strings: Good Children Eat Apples. They have learnt how to read a 'tab' and have been using a tab to play along with three different songs: Be Brave, Get Funky and Hide the Sunshine.





Children have also been using really careful listening skills to tune their ukuleles and decide if the pitch of a note needs to be made higher or lower to fit in with the other instruments.

The children have been really engaged in these wonderful music lessons and having been pushing themselves further by not just playing the ukulele but singing along at the same time.

It is a real pleasure to watch our budding musicians develop confidence with singing, playing and expressing themselves through music!



#### **GARDENING NOTES**

November can seem a rather gloomy month with shorter days and more rain and wind; you may not fancy going out into the garden very much, but ... guess what? It's a crucial month for getting the next year off to a good start.

November is your last chance to plant bulbs for great spring and summer displays; indeed, it's the perfect month for planting tulips. Remember to plant them deep - much deeper than daffodils. About 6-8 inches deep is ideal, and 4-8 inches apart. (You can plant them closer together than this in containers.) You can also plant lily bulbs in containers for next summer, and either keep them under cover over winter, or wrap the pots in some type of insulation material bubble wrap works well. Now is also the time to put out your winter bedding.



It's also the perfect time of year to plant barerooted shrubs, hedge whips, or fruit bushes, before the ground gets too water-logged or too frosty. Plant as soon as possible after delivery and put the roots into a bucket of tepid water for an hour or so before doing so. If you can't plant them straightaway, simply heel them into a pot of compost or raised

bed as a temporary stopgap. They can stay like that for a couple of weeks if necessary.

In the vegetable garden, there's not a great deal to sow. You should put your onion sets in, if you haven't already done so, and sow broad beans indoors or outdoors to ensure an early crop next year. Apart from that, there's quite a lot of pre-winter maintenance to be done. The leaves will be falling thick and fast. I tend to leave the majority of leaves as homes for over-wintering insects, but it's really important to clear the leaves from your ponds and troughs to ensure the water is healthy for fish and other wildlife. Continue to cut down herbaceous perennials after they stop flowering unless you are leaving the dead stems for insect habitats. You can still lift and divide herbaceous perennials too, before the ground is too tricky to dig holes in. Put some mulch over the beds and borderline hardy plants to protect from frost. The mulch will also improve your soil structure and can help to suppress any late-growing weeds.


Finally, don't forget the birds, and keep a ready supply of food and water out for them.

## Recollections of a childhood in Barton on the Heath 1947 – 50 Part 1 "Can We Have the Chillings?"

To obtain these culinary delights you will need a Tardis, with the dial set to "The Lodge, Barton House 1948. On stepping out, beware of passing cars, and if by chance you see one, you can tell your friends, 'I saw a car today, it was black!", it was an event to see a car. Walking to school, we knew every stone on the road, on entering Great Wolford, on the left at the top of the steep bank, was a house that ran a little shop where one could buy 1 penny's worth of broken biscuits.

The great game was to go down the bank at the dip, walk under the bridge and up the other side. The best was to be in the tunnel on the rare occasion a car came along.

My father was 'The Butler'. Cross the road, over the green with the memorial on your left is the large house, to the left of 'Rose Cottage', (which then of course was the Post Office). To the rear of the large house, now gravelled car parking, was a farmyard with a couple of pens for animals, and a sort of dairy backing onto the house, with marble slab worktops.

I was led into the farmyard where several men were standing around a gentleman in a white coat. The centre of attraction was a very large pig which was snuffling on the ground next to a huge pile of straw. It was led away, there was a bang and a squeal, and 'Grunty' had been humanely dispatched. The straw was heaped over his body and then set on fire. This removed all the hair / bristles, and any other health risks. Said carcass was then moved to the dairy and about an hour later, the head was in a bowl; various other utensils contained the heart, liver, kidneys and 4 trotters and another bucket contained the chittlings. in other words, the pig's intestines. These we took home to the Lodge across the green where they were turned inside out with a copper stick on the cold water tap and when cleaned, cooked for a family meal.

School was at Great Wolford. We rode there every day on 'Shank's Pony'; however, if the weather really was bad, heavy rain, snow, ice, etc, we all (6 or 8 of us, all ages) bundled into a sort of estate car with wooden frame sides which may have been a Morris Minor, Estate, I do not remember the names of anyone at school neither teacher's nor class friends, or even if we had school dinners or took a packed lunch. I visited Barton on the heath on August Bank Holiday 2023, while attending the 100 years celebration of the BMW Company, being held at the Fire Service Collage at Morton in the Marsh. My visit to Great Wolford, solved a memory glitch. I recall the school playground ran alongside the stone wall separating the churchyard. That is now a field, and where the school was seems to be a more modern business premises. If there was funeral being held we were not allowed to go out to 'play and were told to 'Keep quiet'. Bigger children would tell us little ones they had seen a skeleton hand waving from a recent grave and dare us to look!!



#### Fly tipping Gargen Waste

Farmer Robert Hutchings is concerned about the increase in the amount of garden waste dumped on farmland and draws attention to the NFU's pronouncements on this dangerous practice. In this immediate vicinity, there have been four incidents of general fly tipping within the last year. With the recent strict measures introduced at Shipston Recycling Centre, he believes that this will likely increase.

The NFU is: 'urging members of the public to be aware of the law and the potential risk to livestock when disposing of their garden waste.'

The NFU has recently been made aware of several concerns from members who have had green waste dumped in their fields by members of the public. It is not just illegal to dispose of garden waste in farmer's fields, but garden waste can be deadly to livestock and wildlife.

Tipping green waste into a farmer's field, or adjacent to the public highway is a form of fly-tipping, which is an offence. Anyone caught fly-tipping waste could now be faced with a fixed penalty notice of up to £1000.

Under the Environmental Protection Act 1990, all householders have a duty of care to ensure that their refuse, including green waste is passed to an authorised person or to a person for authorised transport purposes who can dispose of the waste lawfully. Householders not taking reasonable measures to ensure that their waste is transferred to an authorised person will be committing an offence and could face a fixed penalty notice of up to £600.




#### The Royal British legion Poppy Appeal 2023

#### **Obituary: Jenniter Haine**



Jennifer was born at Sutton under Brailes to a farming family, moving to King Stone Farm, Long Compton in 1958 when she married Keith. They had four children and were very much at the heart of village life, in those days supporting most village events, not least with donations of milk.

Jennifer was a Governor of both Long Compton Primary and Shipston High School and with her daughters Elizabeth and Anne ran various charitable donkey derbys and horseshows in field behind the hall which they farmed. However, it is for her involvement in

organising harvest supper catering that perhaps she is best remembered and particularly for the trifles – liberally soaked in Keith's homemade wine.

The farm relocated out of the village to the top of the hill where she and her many visitors enjoyed the view but sadly for latter part of her life she used a wheelchair and it was fortunate that when the farm was sold a suitable bungalow was found for her at Brailes where she was well looked after by carers and continued to welcome many visitors. When taken to view the property, she recalled it from her childhood as it was originally the hurdle makers workshop.

She died aged 87 in Horton Hospital and fittingly has been returned to Warwickshire soil at the Tysoe Natural Burial Ground

fragile precious and environment that we are so lucky to live in. The irony was not lost on the audience that only that day it was announced that the UK is the most nature depleted country in the G7, and that since the 70s, we have lost approximately half of our biodiversity. What we have is fighting for worth and protecting. Beautiful tracks from the Lost Spells album of poetry by Robert Macfarlane

featuring musician Beth Porter from Brailes accompanied the film.

Then followed a very interesting talk from Rosemary Collier about SWAN - South Warwickshire \_ network, a group of communities working to promote nature and biodiversity in their areas. David Passingham then inspired us as he shared some of the activities that the nature group in his village (Stretton on Fosse) have enjoyed over the past 15 years, including moth and bat evenings, pond dipping and interesting talks from some of the many local experts we have.
